## Islam Faith On Rise Here, Sect Says

## Battered Table, Chair In Bare Room

 Is Braddock Mosque; New Quarters Seł

Fifty Negroes sat in their stocking feet and gazed toward the "Mosque," a battered table and chair at one end of the room.

Most were clad in a fez, makeshift turbans or shawls. A well-worn rug and three light bulbs were the only other furnishings.

A dime lay forlornly in a dish at one end of the table.

The occasion was the weekly meeting of the First Islamic Mosque of Braddock at Ninth and Washington Streets.

The group sat quietly yesterday listening to Sheikh Daoud Ahmed Faisal, founder, spiritual head and director of the Islamic Mission headquartered in Brooklyn.
"These people," said Ahmed, with a wave to his followers, have accepted our teschings. Why can't more do likewise?"
His followers really aren't that in the strictest sense of the word, although they work diligently to perpetuate the faith.

Islam has no membership explains Ahmed. It is an "institution" with the Mosque open " to the entire universe."
as an honorary delegate to the United Nations
"I don't know why I came to this country," he said. "I am heartsick about the treatment of our people here."
"People ask me about America. I must defend you everywhere. I say you have come from generations of slavery and are not yet ready."

Islam has never caught on here because it's never been taught, the spiritual leader contends. Its teachers have been continually mocked, jeer ed and suppressed, he said.
"Man is just now seeing the light," Ahmed added, and the sect is thriving.
The Braddock mission is growing rapidly and will move into new quarters with. in the next few weeks.
"Peace be with you," the converts chorused as the reporters left.

The self-proclaimed leader travels widely spreading his gospel. He has been in this country 48 years since migrating from his native Morocco.

He founded the mission in
